

## Comic Strip Project

Comics – a series of sequential images used to tell a story – date back to prehistoric times. But, the traditional newspaper comic strip that we know and read today originated in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century. While this form of comics has been around for over a hundred years, the writing, art, lettering, and production has evolved with society.

**Directions:** You will create a 4 panel comic strip or 1-page comic today – your story will introduce and develop a character. Focus on the setting – when and where will your story take place? Pick a conflict – what will stand between your character and his or her goal? Think about character’s personality – what motivates this character and how will they respond to their conflict?

### Comic Strip Project Requirements:

1. Select or create a character
2. Determine the setting, and figure out how you will establish the setting in one frame
3. Select an appropriate conflict for the character, setting, and frame constraints
4. Brainstorm (with bullet points) how you will show your character’s personality, where the character comes from, and/or what will motivate your character)
5. Write a 4 panel comic script or 1-page comic that follows the 3 act structure and tells a story about your character
6. Write a 1 paragraph reflection on how you use the images and words to convey your theme/message
